

### WE HAVE REDUCED OUR VENUE **AND WEDDING RATES!**

We have some great news! Whilst the cost of living continues to go up, we are pleased to announce that our venue and wedding rates reduced on 1 April 2023.

Here are some examples of what this means:

#### Looking to have a birthday party for your child in the day during half term?

Hire the large room at Egerton Hall - now only £12 per hour (old price =  $\pm 25$  p/h). For a 4-hour party hire, that's a total of  $\pm 48!$ 

#### Looking to have a family get together but don't have enough room to host at home?

Hire the Old Fire Station for a couple of hours on a weekend for £15 per hour or the Town Hall for £20 per hour.

### Work from home? Need a meeting room?

Hire the small room at Egerton Hall for only £12 per hour during business hours Monday-Friday.

#### Do you have a larger business and need to meet in town?

Hire the Town Hall for £15 an hour (old price =  $\pm 50 \text{ p/h}$ ) during the week before 5pm. Even better, there is no minimum booking time.

#### Are you a local charity or not-for-profit organisation?

Hire the Old Fire Station Community Room during the week between 8am and 5pm for only f5 per hour (old price = f10 p/h).

#### Want to get married locally?

Hire the Town Hall for a wedding ceremony (up to 5 hours) on a weekend and it will now only cost you £350 (previously £500). If you want to carry on with the party then hire the whole of Egerton Hall for your evening reception, for £35.00 per hour.

#### Why hire our venues?

We offer a dry hire in our venues 7 days a week. Dry hire means you are only hiring the venue and its space. This gives you greater flexibility over which suppliers you use and how you style the space.

Please note when booking that set-up and tidy up/cleaning time will need to be included in the timings of the hire so don't forget to add some additional time before and after the event.

## AN INSIGHT INTO WORKING LIFE AT

### BRACKLEY TOWN COUNCIL...

At the end of March, two Year 12 students from Magdalen College School, Eliza Green and Charlotte Ansell spent a week with our town council team for their work experience placement.

Eliza and Charlotte concluded their time by writing a short blog about how their week went and what they got up to on each day...

### MONDAY 27<sup>TH</sup> MARCH

When we walked in at 9am we were quite nervous, but it was refreshing to see friendly faces, and talk to people who were very happy to talk to us about their job roles.

One of the first things we did was learn about the history and layout of Brackley Town Council, particularly concerning the legal background to all its activities, which have to be run according to the Local Government Act of 1972. Additionally, we learned about how often Council Meetings and Committee Meetings are held, and the responsibilities of Brackley's 16 Councillors. We were also briefly taken through the revised budget of the town council, and the budget of 2023-4.

At about 10.30am, we were very kindly given a tour around Brackley, where we looked at the three venues owned and maintained by the town council: the Town Hall (including The Loft), the Old Fire Station, and Egerton Hall.

To finish off the day, we started creating posters to inform the public of the renting rates for each of the three venues we looked at earlier in the day. It was interesting to learn how the rates have actually lowered since last season, effective from the start of April. Designing the



posters was such a fun and creative way of learning about the three different types of rent, according to: commercial (business) rates; private rates (e.g. for weddings and birthday parties); and not-for-profit rates (for charities and church events).

### **TUESDAY 28<sup>TH</sup> MARCH**

The second day was much less scary, as we had both rather enjoyed the day before.

We started off by going out with the estates team in our hi visibility vests, to clean and pressure-wash the playground in the town park; we also learned about how the town park is actually owned by the National Trust, but is leased to the Town Council via a 'peppercorn rent'. The town council cleans and maintains many playgrounds throughout Brackley, in order to preserve and provide the local community with fresh open spaces, and today we cleaned the playground adjacent to the Old Fire Station. This included pressure-washing the floor and equipment, in order to get rid of any moss or mud, so that the playground continues to be a fun and safe space for children to enjoy, and we also got rid of any large clumps of weeds on the outskirts of the play equipment, so that any further trip hazards to younger children were removed.

This was all rather muddy work (but quite fun), and it took all morning, so once we had our lunch break and dried up a bit in the warm, we continued making the posters that we had started on our first day.

Finally, we learned about the important role that the town council plays in maintaining cemeteries, arranging burials, and both organising and checking the stability of gravestones.

### WEDNESDAY 29TH MARCH

To start off our third day in the office, we went out with the estates team again, to chip logs and operate tractors to turn the woodchips over. This was simultaneously both incredibly fun and very informative, since we were learning about how the Brackley Town Council estates team is self-sufficient in that it makes its own compost



(consisting predominantly

of the woodchip we made today), while also having fun and driving the tractors! Charlotte was definitely a natural at this: it looked like she had been driving tractors all her life!

On the way back from chipping wood and driving tractors, we stopped in at the building (near the old train station), where the town council estates team keep all of their equipment, as well as all of the stuff used at events. It was quite surreal to see the large Christmas tree (which is put up in December outside of the Town Hall) dismembered and packed up into loads of little boxes!

Once we had dried up again (we were even muddier than yesterday), we went down to the Town Hall to post notices on the board outside, concerning the upcoming Committee Meeting – in doing this we learned that displaying the agenda for the meeting was a legal requirement, as otherwise the meeting would not have a proper founding and so would have to be postponed, or even cancelled.

We then went to the cemetery, in order to consolidate our learning from yesterday, and on the way back we learned all about TPOs (Tree Protection Orders).

### THURSDAY 30<sup>™</sup> MARCH

The main tasks done today were: finishing the posters on the new rent rates for the three venues maintained and hired out by Brackley Town Council; and we also designed some posts for Instagram, Facebook, Twitter, and for the Brackley Town Council website, regarding the fact that the council has actually won the Customers' Choice Awards 2023 for 'The Loft' (a holiday home situated on the third floor of the town hall). We were lucky enough to have been taken up to see The Loft on Monday (during our tour around Brackley), and so creating these posts was both really fun and quite special, because we were able to draw inspiration from a firsthand experience.

### FRIDAY 31<sup>st</sup> MARCH

For our last day, we finalised any projects we had started over the past week, including this blog! We also helped to update the forms for regular hirers for the three venues that Brackley Town Council has to offer. All that needed doing was to check the computer system to see if these regular hirers were still renting from the town council, and then update their forms to 'April ongoing', but it was still really cool to have a look at the behind-the-scenes action regarding venue bookings, and it was amazing to feel like we were a part of such an important (and somewhat complicated) process.

We were also very fortunate to hear all about the role of the Communications, Marketing and Events Officer. She works unswervingly to organise key events for the community, and liaises between multiple parties to make celebrations (such as last year's Jubilee, the fireworks display, all of the Christmas events etc etc) possible, all within a small budget. She is also in charge of running all of the town council's social media accounts, and creates all of the advertisements and flyers that we may see both online and around town.

She spoke to us also about the difficulties that Brackley Town Council faces when unexpected circumstances occur, such as the sudden passing of the Queen in September last year, and how she had to rearrange certain events on an even smaller budget because the events that had to be cancelled involved payments that were non-refundable. Her efforts (and that of the whole team) are simply inspirational because trying to keep all of the residents of Brackley happy is no easy task, yet they all work persistently year-round to achieve it.

We would like to thank the team for being patient with us over the last week, and for letting us being a part of such a unique and diverse town council, which tirelessly operates every day, both visibly and behind the scenes, to serve the community that we are so proud to live in.


