

ANNUAL REPORT SUMMARY 2023-24

Welcome to our latest annual report. We have a good mixture of experience and enthusiasm in both our staff and councillors with a shared commitment to improve the physical and social environment of Brackley. We aim to keep Brackley a space where people are proud to live, work and enjoy visiting.

Our estates team extended "No Mow May" to include areas in St James Lake, Mill Lane, Rose Open Space, the front section of Swift Way, Halse Road and the open space near the Rugby Club. They also planted more wild flower areas at several locations throughout the town as well as further trees. Hanging baskets and planters continue to be an attractive feature of the town. Our parks and open spaces are loved and enjoyed on a daily basis by lots of residents and visitors.

The excellent and well-maintained community venues saw an increase in bookings taken from residents. Our rates for venue hire are kept very competitive for the benefit of residents that wish to use them. Further details can be found on our website.

The expertise we have on our planning committee ensures that our views are respected and considered by the decision makers at West Northamptonshire Council. In the year 2023-24, we commented on 81 planning applications.

At the annual meeting in May 2022, Cllr Sue Sharps was elected Mayor of Brackley with Cllr Elaine Wiltshire as Deputy Mayor. At the end of Cllr Sharps's term as Mayor, she had raised £11,300 which was split between her chosen charities – South Northants Youth Engagement and Brackley Foodbank.

Bleed kits were installed at 3 locations – The Old Fire Station, Egerton Hall and the Town Centre toilets.

WHAT DID THE ROMANS DO IN BRACKLEY?

Brackley has a long history that goes back some two thousand years to the Roman era. This was showcased by Brackley Museum community group at Brackley Library last autumn. Brackley was near to the important Roman town of Lactodurum (now Towcester) on the major Roman highway of Watling Street (now the A5) which connected Londinium (London) to the fourth largest settlement in Roman Britain, Viroconium (Wroxeter), and also the extensive Roman trading settlement recently discovered at Blackgrounds (Chipping Warden). Therefore it is not surprising that Brackley has its own evidence of Roman settlement. What the Romans / Romano-British were doing in Brackley is, however, still poorly understood. Here is what we know.

A number of finds, studies and excavations have shed some light on what was going on in Brackley in the Roman period and this is what archaeologists have discovered:

- Building work in the 1970s on land SSE of St Peters Church, for construction of what is now known as the Roman Estate off Buckingham Road, revealed evidence of an extensive and high status Roman settlement, probably a villa complex. Finds included pottery, Samian ware, roof and flue tiles, tesserae, plaster and much coarse ware indicating late Roman occupation. Coins of Severus Alexander, Tetricus I, Gallienus and Crispus were also found as well as foundations of walls, a cobbled floor and a covered stone gully.
- Roman finds have been uncovered in Old Town.
 Recently a possible Roman ditch along with
 numerous Roman finds were excavated at Pebble
 Lane, and in 2011 a trial archaeological trench was
 dug at Egerton Close which included some small
 Roman finds.
- Pottery sherds and a scraper have been found in Brackley. And in 1974 in a Brackley garden north of the Roman estate villa site, a gold signet ring cut with a representation of the goddess Ceres.

property of a wealthy villa owner who wanted a portrait of the Emperor, since a number of villa sites have been identified in the area between Brackley and Banbury. The bronze head can be seen at the Ashmolean Museum in Oxford.

- A Roman coin hoard comprising 3,153 coins in an earthenware vase was discovered at Evenly in the 1850s. Most of the coins had been minted in London and Trier, the major mint of the Western Roman Empire, but the hoard also included coins minted in Carthage (Tunisia).
- NE of Brackley, at Illets Farm close to Radstone, HS2 are excavating a Roman temple and farm settlement and so more will be learned about that site soon.
- Evidence of a further Roman settlement NW of Brackley has been noted but little is known.

People lived, farmed and worked and were in the military in Roman times where we live now whether they lived here or were just passing through which is awesome to consider. Thank you to Brackley Museum for collating an excellent exhibition at Brackley Library to showcase our Roman local heritage.

With excitement mounting at the return of this year's Strictly Dancing programme on TV it reminded me of when the first tribute Strictly came to Brackley, way back in 2011. A young Polish dance enthusiast, Andrzej Mialkowski, who was already running classes in Banbury was also now holding dance sessions in Brackley Town Hall. A chance meeting in the Town Council office just after Andrzej had staged a very successful tribute Strictly competition in Banbury prompted the question, asked in a rather injured tone "if you are holding classes in our Town Hall, why can't we have a Strictly competition in Brackley too?" And before you could say cha-cha-cha Strictly By Brackley was on its way!

The word went out for Volunteers to participate and after varying degrees of persuasion there were 18 'celebrities' ready to meet the 'professionals'. They came from across the local community, representing businesses in the town, the sporting life, the comparatively new Head of MCS and of course, since the idea was formed in her office, the Deputy Town Clerk. The dates were set for the first weekend in September and intensive weekly practices were held throughout August in the Town Hall. The event itself was held in Waynflete Hall, complete with Glitter Ball and the stage from which the couples could descend to make a dramatic entrance on to the dance floor. There were four judges who took their roles very seriously, the audience waited with baited breath to see which number between 1 – 10 would be revealed on each 'Paddle'.

There was no precedent to show us what to do. The novelty of the event which made it all great fun also brought an air of determination to make it a great success for both audience and dancers. One of the celebrities, lan Mr Topsy Turvey Walker, recalled being very nervous on the competition night but found the experience so infectious he went on to become a professional, dancing in 15 more Strictlies and winning the trophy at Strictly Brackley 2012. 14 years on Strictly keeps Brackley dancing. And this year, is it Brackley who has given the TV programme a good idea? The blind comedian, Chris McCausland has been asked to join the celebrities but as lan pointed out, he danced to second place with his blind partner Rachel Nafzger in 2016 – we did it first in Brackley!



THE BRACKLEY SKATEPARK

The Brackley Skatepark project has finally concluded and is open to the public. Locals of all ages have been enjoying the park since the moment it opened. It has not just been young up-and-coming skaters taking to the concrete half pipes, many pads, and rails at the new park; we have seen some local skating veterans who have been around since before the idea had ever been discussed using the park to its fullest extent, and showing us what is possible with hard work and years of practice.

The idea for a skatepark originated in the early 2000s when local skaters worked on putting together a wooden park on Turweston Road. Unfortunately, this didn't last, so Brackley locals and skaters from further afield put together a video on the town Piazza campaigning for a permanent local skatepark. The video was then posted on YouTube to raise awareness when the platform was still very much in its infancy.

Once the idea was successfully seeded in the town's collective consciousness, the long and challenging process of creating the skatepark began. Over the years, Brackley Town Council, West Northamptonshire Council, construction companies, and residents of Brackley discussed each element of the operation in great detail. For a project as substantial as this, location, planning, conditions, and contractors, among a myriad of finer points, took a significant time to negotiate to finally enable the park's construction. Once Maverick Skateparks had been selected as the contractor, a skatepark user group comprising of local skaters helped develop the skatepark's design to ensure it would fit the needs of all the individuals who would be using it.



After many long days of hard work from everyone involved in ironing out the details, construction began on June 10th, 2024. Maverick Skateparks worked tirelessly over the summer to finish the new park, which was finally complete after over 12 weeks of intense construction on September 6th, 2024. Initially, the skatepark was sch<mark>eduled</mark> to be completed in April 2025; however, Brackley's Skatepark was brought forward due to a lucky cancellation, which allowed the construction to begin early.

From a concept born from residents nearly 20 years earlier, the Brackley Skatepark is now a shining example of how hard work and determination pay dividends, as Brackley now has a well-designed, sturdy, and exciting asset to show for all the years of effort on the part of everyone involved. The local community is already showing a lot of well-earned love, care, and respect for the park, and alongside skating, they are making sure to sweep and clean it in order to maintain its condition.

The Brackley Council would like to thank everyone involved throughout

the process of inspiring, designing, and building the Skatepark. It has taken years of persistent effort to realise this dream. We want to express our gratitude to the residents, councillors, and staff who have dedicated their time to completing the project, and we look forward to seeing the skills of Brackley skaters develop as a result of our new skatepark.
