Garden waste subscriptions are open

Residents across West Northamptonshire can now sign up for optional, chargeable garden waste collections from April 2023.

The annual subscription charge for the fortnightly service from April 2023 to the end of March 2024 is £55 per bin and **people can subscribe via the link on our website**

Residents also now have the option to sign up for an annual Direct Debit to save having to remember to renew every year. Residents who are unable to access the internet can subscribe to the service by phoning the council on 0300 126 7000.

Once households are signed up to the service, they will receive their new 2023/24 garden waste permit which they will be asked to stick on their garden waste bin. Any bins that have not subscribed will not be emptied after 4 April.



The communications plan to promote the service begins in earnest this week, and existing subscribers are being sent emails inviting them to re-subscribe.

Many people value the garden waste service, however there are others who don't need these collections. By ensuring that it is an optional service, only those who wish to receive the service have to pay for it, making it as fair for residents as possible.

People who do not wish to sign up to the service have the option of composting their garden waste at home, either in a traditional compost heap or by purchasing a compost bin by visiting **www.getcomposting.com** and typing in their postcode to see offers available.

People can also recycle garden waste for free at any of our household waste recycling centres.

Council sets out budget for 2023/24

Our Council has set a balanced budget for the year ahead that will protect essential frontline services whilst addressing significant financial challenges.

At the Full Council meeting in Northampton's Guildhall on Wednesday, 22 February, members approved the final budget proposals, Housing Revenue Account and setting of the Council Tax for 2023/24.

In common with local authorities across the country, the Council is facing severe financial pressures due to factors including the current economic climate, high inflation rates driving up running costs and an increase in demand for services, particularly around supporting children in care and vulnerable adults.

Despite these pressures, the Council has worked hard to balance the books and has set a balanced revenue budget for 2023/24 of £383.5m (excluding grant funded schools spending of £443.7m).

The budget includes a Council Tax increase of 4.99%, well below current inflation rates and in line with the Government's allowance, crucially generating extra funding of around $\pounds 12m$ – with 2% of the increase going towards funding adult social care. This represents an average increase on a Band D property of $\pounds 80.50$ a year, the equivalent of $\pounds 1.55$ a week.

The approved budget follows a strong commitment to making services as efficient as possible and reviewing income streams in order to maintain and protect services, with £32.0m of savings proposals put forward.

It also incorporates a range of additional measures to



address people's feedback in the recent budget public consultation, which attracted over 3,000 comments from residents, businesses, partners and other stakeholders. It has also been subject to continuous review and scrutiny, including consideration by the cross party group of members of the Corporate Overview and Scrutiny Committee.

The additional plans include investing an extra $\pounds 1m$ in the year ahead towards repairing local roads and changes to car parking proposals include putting in place two hours' free parking on Saturdays and Sundays in Northampton's town centre off street car parks and a set weekend all-day charge of $\pounds 2.20$ for off street car parks, introducing free parking up to 10.30am on Saturdays at Daventry and Brixworth country parks and reducing the proposed maximum daily charge at the two sites by a third to $\pounds 8$.

In addition to this, the Council will be investing up to $\pounds 215,000$ in the year ahead towards bus services. This continues the funding allocated for the current year, while the Council shapes a new bus strategy and considers the most viable options for supporting and delivering the services in the future.

Next year's budget will see our Council invest an additional £30m in capital funding – money earmarked to improve local infrastructure and assets such as land, buildings, and equipment – on a range of projects, some of which will help reduce costs and generate income to support services in future years. Schemes set to move forward in the year ahead will help tackle speeding in rural areas, create new cycleways and footpaths for healthier travel, and improve local roads.

Over the last 12 months since we set our budget for this last year, we have worked hard to address the unprecedented challenges we've faced. We could not have predicted the national picture we're facing with demand on services and rising costs; however, we have acted on this quickly and put robust processes in place to manage this year's budget.

To ensure the future sustainable delivery of services, we must do what we can to ensure we continue this work to manage our budget going forward.

Please join Coronation weekend celebrations

Town and parish councils are being encouraged to get involved in a Bank Holiday weekend of special events being planned to mark the Coronation of King Charles III.

His Majesty will be crowned at Westminster Abbey in London on Saturday 6 May 2023, the first of three days of celebrations as communities across the country are invited to come together to mark the historic occasion.

Plans are under way to organise a packed weekend of festivities in West Northamptonshire from 6 to 8 May, including street party-style activities and big screens in Northampton town centre on the Saturday, a Big Lunch at Delapre Abbey on the Sunday and local volunteering opportunities for the Big Help Out on Bank Holiday Monday.

A countywide Coronation Service at All Saints' Church in Northampton is also planned for 30 April.

Residents are encouraged to come together and celebrate too - by holding coronation street parties in their communities, parishes and neighbourhoods.

We have set up a <u>Coronation information hub on our</u> website, containing information and advice on holding an event.



Those thinking of holding a street party may need to **apply for a temporary road closure**. There is no charge for this between 6 and 8 May 2023, though applications must be made by Monday 27 March.

Communities planning larger parties are also urged to <u>let us know about the event</u>, so we can provide guidance on licensing, safety and traffic management.

Communities are also being encouraged to **join in The Big Help Out** on Monday, 8 May, which will provide an opportunity to reflect on the legacy of His Majesty's service and showcase the impact of volunteering within communities.

Businesses join workplace wellbeing forum

Industry leaders from warehouse, transport and logistic businesses across West Northants joined West Northamptonshire Council to learn more about wellbeing in the workplace.

WNC's health protection, public health and regulatory service colleagues held the forum for businesses at the Ford Motor Company, in Daventry earlier this month. Representatives from Ford Motor Company Ltd, DHL and Pristine International attended to encourage and share best practice with businesses.



The forum provided businesses with information on future health and safety priorities and initiatives, to encourage change and reduce accidents that result from occupational behaviour.

Key topics included staff training, a focus on wellbeing and how this can reduce accidents in the workplace, as well as how to manage workplace hazards.

Emissions report starts journey to sustainability

Our Council has presented its baseline emissions report for 2021-22, as we strive to meet our sustainability goal to be net zero by 2030.

Sustainability is high on the agenda for our Council, with work underway to meet the Government's call for local authorities to support the delivery of the UK's sustainability agenda.

Our baseline report provides a robust set of baseline CO2e emissions data for the Council's first year, April 2021 – 31 March 2022 and outlines our intentions to eliminate or reduce these. Establishing the baseline for our emissions will enable the Council to develop a detailed emissions reduction plan and monitor progress towards our targets.

This is a pivotal step to ensuring we not only meet our target of being net zero by 2030, but go above and beyond this. This will be challenging, and it will involve all of us across West Northants. But by understanding our current CO2e emissions, we can ensure we take the right steps to reduce these and put measures in place to protect our environment for years to come.

Whilst the emissions report is vital in tracking our environmental sustainability, a great deal of work is also being done to ensure future social and economic sustainability, for both present and future generations.

We are embarking on a bold new approach to make West Northamptonshire a more sustainable place to live and work. The steps we have taken so far are many and varied, from removing single-use cups in our offices, to increased solar energy, and considering how we can invest in electric powered waste vehicles to reduce our outputs.

I would like to encourage town and parish councils to visit our website and review the emissions report, and individuals are also urged to make a pledge to live a more sustainable lifestyle, inspiring others to come on this journey with us.

There are three key Sustainability Pledges which outline our primary commitments, which are to:

- Net Zero the Council's own emissions by 2030 and those of residents and businesses by 2045
- Take a community leadership role for Sustainability in West Northants
- Ensure all Council strategies and policies are aligned to and contribute to the delivery of the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals.



Funding awarded to improve air quality

Our Council has been successful in a bid to secure funds as part of the Government's £10.1 million project towards air quality improvement.

We have received £292,378 from Government to roll-out new initiatives to improve air-quality in Northampton. This complements a further grant awarded in 2021/22 for £148,297 which is focused on active traffic management to improve congestion and poor air quality in existing air quality management areas.

The new grant will provide funding to develop an evidence base for possible action to deal with particulate pollution in the West Northants.



Struggling households can access support

Struggling households in West Northamptonshire who work but are on a low wage can apply for the Government's Household Support Fund and potentially receive £250 in cash.

We are urging residents on a wage of £400 or less to visit the **Household Support Fund page on our website** or call on 0300 126 7000 to check if they are eligible for the payment, which is paid into a bank account in two instalments.

This scheme aims to support those who have not received any of the \pounds 650 Cost of Living Payment and the previous phase of the Household Support Fund.

People will need to be earning less than £400 a week and must provide:

- Two of their most recently monthly payslips or four of their most recent weekly wage slips
- Identification such as a recent bank statement, driving licence or recent utility bill.



The first award of £125 will be credited to the applicant's bank account at the point of approval of the application. The second payment will be credited to the same bank account 60 days later.

To qualify, people must be employed, have a valid bank account, live in the region, not been in receipt of the recent \pounds 650 government Cost-of-Living payments and be over 18.

The rising cost of living is causing uncertainty, worry and concern for many of us right now, but we want people to know – you are not alone and there is lots happening both in the local community and nationally that can offer support.

Our Council's Anti-Poverty Strategy sets out how we will work with partners to support people struggling financially, what we will do to stop people falling into poverty and how we will work to get the best deal for the people of West Northants. This work is underway, and we are committed to its delivery.

Residents can access a full range of Cost-of-Living assistance on our <u>Cost of Living Support</u> <u>Hub</u>, which is full of information and advice to help residents find support and help.

Have a say on rural cost of living survey

People living in rural areas are being urged to complete a survey on the cost of living.

The Rural Services Network (RSN), in partnership with the Citizens Advice Rural Issues Group, has launched the Rural Cost of Living Household Survey to understand more about rural household budgets during what is a very difficult time for many.

Independent research commissioned by the RSN in the summer last year showed rural areas are suffering more acutely from the cost of living crisis compared to urban areas.

To lend more weight to the argument for more funding for rural areas the RSN is calling on as many rural residents as possible to complete a Rural Cost of Living Household Survey.

Research has shown that those living in rural areas face extra costs and the RSN wants to explore the impacts for households. Town and Parish Councils can help spread the word by forwarding the survey link to contacts and networks: **Rural Households Survey on the Cost of Living**

Update on our building control services

Plans are progressing to bring Building Control services back in-house to West Northants Council from the beginning of April 2023.

Back in 2015 the Building Control function for the former Daventry District Council was transferred to a shared service with Warwick and Rugby Councils.

Following the establishment of West Northamptonshire Council, work has been ongoing with partners, officers and stakeholders to bring this service back in house to enable a single consistent service to be provided across the whole of West Northants. These plans are well underway and are now nearing completion, as part of this work we are in the process of recruiting for new colleagues to join the new structure.

We will continue to keep you updated on the progress of this work and anticipate that contact details and more information about the service will be shared later this month.

New SEND provision to help children succeed

New facilities providing specialist teaching and learning for pupils with special educational needs in Northamptonshire have been officially opened.

Butterfly Meadow at Hardingstone Academy was opened by East Midlands Academy Trust in partnership with our Council and provides much-needed additional school places for children in Key Stage 2 with social and communication difficulties.

A second department – Caterpillar Pod – for Key Stage 1 learners with special educational needs has also been opened at another school within the Trust, Castle Academy.

The two departments support children who have an Education, Health and Care Plan (EHCP) for communication and interaction needs, specifically Autism Spectrum Disorder.



It is important that our children and young people access the best possible education and health provision that support their needs, and Butterfly Meadow provides just this.

The opening of this provision is part of our Council's commitment to increase the number of specialist school places by 2024 which are built around the latest understanding of what's best for children with special educational needs and provides them with a learning environment that will help them thrive.

Support service for young people is changing

The Northamptonshire Information Advice and Support Service (IASS) is changing.

From 1 April it will split into services for West and North, with the West Northants SEND IAS Service covering the West Northamptonshire area.

Operating at arm's length from the Council, it will continue to provide free, confidential, impartial advice, guidance and support to families and young people. Staff will continue to be independently trained and have an understanding of the local offer, schools and local resources.

Its branding is also being changed following consultation with the Northamptonshire Parent Forum Group (NPFG) and with the IASS Young People's Advisory Council. The change in branding will support people to know they are contacting the correct team for their locality.

West Northants to play a key role in Arc

Proposals for a locally-led partnership for the Oxford to Cambridge Arc have been given the green light by the government.

The partnership, which includes Northamptonshire, will champion the region as a world leader of innovation and business, acting to achieve environmentally sustainable and inclusive growth. It will strengthen the cross-boundary collaboration among its partners to focus on tackling the issues that matter to the people who live and work in the region.



The partnership's initial programme is to:

- Develop a set of propositions to attract international investment and profile the region on a global stage
- Continue the work underway to embed shared environment principles

West Northants is right at the heart of the arc and we want to make sure we play a key role in helping shape its future, to the benefit of our residents.

We have ambitious plans to continue to deliver high-quality jobs, boost economic growth and attract world-class employment and innovation opportunities to our area, and this partnership will enable that.

This is an exciting opportunity to work with partners to improve our region and demonstrate all of the benefits we can bring to this initiative.

Following the official commitment from government, the Partnership will begin active recruitment of an independent Chair. In the interim, a Shadow Board has been set up to oversee the Partnership's programme and agree governance and funding.

Temporary new location for town market

Communities are being urged to support traders at Northampton's Market temporary location at Commercial St Car Park.

The market will trade from Commercial Street, near TK Maxx in the town centre, for around 18 months while the multi-million pound redevelopment of Market Square works take place.



Traders will not pay any rent or utility fees while they are based at their temporary home, but continue to offer the same fantastic produce and services, and we are urging everyone to continue to support them at the new location before we welcome them back to a revitalised Market Square next year.

The Square is to be rejuvenated over the next 18 months, with new high-quality paving, a flexible event space, bespoke fixed stalls, more trees, tiered seating and a water feature. Once completed, it will offer and exciting new focal point for shoppers and visitors to the town centre.
